

That We Might Receive This Joy

This year's Easter artwork by Jan Richardson, entitled "*That We Might Receive This Joy*," offers a deceptively understated visual for contemplating the miracle of the Resurrection.

Against a dark backdrop, three bowls are stacked atop one another. Initially, we might see darkness, rusticity, and plainness. Upon closer look, however, we notice the shimmer of light imprinted against the background, the luminous silver of the bowls, the brimming gold spilling into the vessels below. The gold, we see, overtakes the dark. The silver stands out against the starkness. An abundant fullness surpasses the initial simplicity. What we may have perceived as sparse holds a richness that abounds. The image is transformed by our vision—and so are we.

Easter is hope born out of darkness. From the death and despair of the crucifixion, it arrives unheralded, almost unseen. But this miracle spread just as the gold spills over the edges...uncontainable.

Hope Overflowing...

The question, then, is how we will receive it into our hearts—and how we will then share it with others. The image's title confers its blessing toward that aim—for we need the grace to do so. For God so loved the world— that we might receive this joy, this hope, this transformation.

We invite you to sit with the image and contemplate what it means for you at this time in your individual life and in our collective society. We hope Richardson's image inspires you in receiving and holding the hope of Easter.

Where in your life do you need "Hope Overflowing"?

We all move through uncertainty, fear, and loss of many kinds. But we simultaneously hold the potential for joy, courage, and awe even in the darkest of times. The Easter story is anything but understated in its sweeping, upending claim. From the "finality" of death, the Resurrection rewrites everything we thought we knew. The scope of hope is broken open.
